4.1 **Chairperson Beth Campbell** read an email submitted by Ms. Megan Hill and Mr. Josh Willaims - 56 Patricia Lane, Thomaston

Dear, Francine Coss & Board of Ed.

A normal in person school day is from 8:15-3:10. My 5 year old who is in kindergarten Blake is roughly doing 2 hours of Live distance learning a day. Once he logs off, it is the parents responsibility to teach him. The parent who didn't go to college to learn to be a teacher, the child who doesn't know how to read and is unable to do anything by himself.

I also have a 4 year old who is live distance learning in her pre k class. Which is the same concept, these kids are suppose to be learning life skills.

Last week my son refused to do his online work and is unable to communicate why he is so upset. You have taken away his routine, his friends and he is acting out due to all of this. I reached out to a therapist and she said this is not a normal way of life to keep our children locked up in their homes day after day. With the cold weather coming it is even more difficult to go outside and play.

Besides all of this my husband and I are both essential employees, I work for Eversource and report to work daily and for the past 5 months we have been working weekends and overnights due to the weather and outages. My husband owns a construction company and we recently just bought commercial property in Thomaston and he needs to work.

We don't rely on the school being a "daycare" for us, we are looking for the best possible education for our children. We could have chosen not to send our children to Black Rock School and keep them at Play and Learn. Our children were at Play and Learn since they were 3 years old but they don't provide the same curriculum and STANDARDS as the public school system. There isn't enough time in the day for us to be able to teach our kids since we report to work everyday and work 10 plus hours a day.

We have hired a college freshman to help this winter but she is not equipped to deal with all of these "MENTAL / EMOTIONAL" issues.

Litchfield and Region 15 elementary hasn't closed and they continue to be in school 5 days a week this ENTIRE time!

Region 15 center school and high school are virtually right now but they are going back Today.

Also our Govern and our President have stated the SAFEST place for our children is IN SCHOOL, WHY ARE WE NOT FOLLOWING THEIR SUGGESTION????

My children's educations and mental health is VERY important to us. We believe the best option is for our children to be "IN SCHOOL AND IN PERSON".

Please forward this email to the BOE Members and maybe we could keep the elementary school open and center school open. I haven't seen any emails recently with a student from Black rock school with a positive covid test! The current system is FAILING our children lets think outside the box!

Also my husband has called Francine NUMBERSOUS times to discuss these issues and we haven't received a phone call back! This is unacceptable!

Chairperson Beth Campbell stated that since this correspondence was sent to **Superintendent Coss** via email. **Superintendent Coss** did provide a response by email and a telephone call to the parent. It was determined that the parent did not leave voice messages for **Superintendent Coss**.

4.2. **Chairperson Beth Campbell** read a public comment that was submitted by Mr. Shawn McGee - 45 Woodbridge, Thomaston

"I am truly curious to the point of the last survey as it seems the decision was already made to go remote. The survey results did not delineate between the various age groups of students and grade levels of teachers, respectively. I am sure the majority of individuals not affected or minimally affected were parents with older students and I am confident those results directly correlated with that group of teachers. Remote learning is easier for older students and that bogus survey did not account for that. I watch my son, his classmates, and his teacher struggle daily to "get through curriculum". It is sad.

That being said, has there been any movement on a plan to at least get the elementary kids back in person? Numerous schools around Thomaston are in person at all levels and I do not see why our kids are not in school. I would rather be inconvenienced with the occasional "quarantine" than be inundated with the juggling act that is remote learning every single day.

Also, can we please stop with the emails notifying us every time someone is sick? It does not show transparency. It's an attempt to justify closing schools when in fact it just solidifies the fact that it will spread regardless of if schools open or not.

The masks work, get the kids back in school, please."

Chairperson Beth Campbell stated that the Board of Education will respond in writing as is the protocol.


